Our Work

Benchmarking Melbourne 2022

At the beginning of 2022, Committee for Melbourne, with its partner JLL, released its inaugural *Benchmarking Melbourne 2022* report. The Business of Cities was commissioned to conduct an independent assessment of Melbourne's performance against 19 global peer cities.

Melbourne's performance was ranked under the three pillars that underpin a great city and around which the Committee's work is aligned – Future Economy, Infrastructure & Sustainability, and Liveability & Urban Optimisation.

The report shows there is much for Melburnians to be proud of.

Melbourne performs strongly for its image, influence, and world class cultural and sporting events. It also excels in education, attracting talent and skills, inclusivity and being a safe and friendly place to visit, do business, study, and raise a family.

The Benchmarking Melbourne report also unpacks areas that can be improved, providing a clearer picture of what is needed

for our city as we emerge and plan beyond the pandemic. Melbourne can improve in areas such as affordable housing, attraction and retention of international students and immigrants, developing a plan for freight, and commercialisation of innovation.

At the same time, the report recognises the significant investment made by the Victorian Government to deliver on major projects such as infrastructure, technology and housing affordability, which may improve Melbourne's rankings over time.

The release of *Benchmarking Melbourne* aimed to kickstart an important conversation with all Victorians. This was achieved with significant media coverage and ongoing discussion about the data.

The report's influence as a rich information source for Melbourne's thought leaders was borne out at the August 2022 event, where around 80 members joined us at JLL's offices. Leanne Edwards - Director Policy, Committee for Melbourne and Annabel McFarlane - Senior Director, JLL Research, guided the audience on the key themes of the report. For example,

the report highlighted there is a stark divergence between what residents of Melbourne experience – dependent on where they live and work. This 'tale of two cities' means that some Melburnians are experiencing more congestion, higher costs of living and less access to amenities and services, the further they live from the CBD. This is of particular concern for the Committee as we represent a broad cross-sectoral membership across the whole of Greater Melbourne.




Liveability & Urban Optimisation Standing Committee

Some of the key themes covered were:

- The impact of intermittent and extended lockdown periods on Melbourne's **international education** sector and the reputational damage that has followed. Only bold and ambitious policy reforms will help repair the damage and restore Melbourne's competitiveness with other international education destinations.
- The importance of the **Port of Melbourne** to the city's growing freight task and the need to ensure the interests of the port, as well as the city's supply chain infrastructure, are protected.
- **Manchester United's** tour down under was a pertinent reminder of the economic and international brand projection benefits that come to Melbourne with hosting **major events**.
- Creating a more digitally connected Melbourne with the 'Victorian Gigabit State Program Fund,' with the Victorian Government committing \$73 million to focus on improving connectivity between Melbourne and our region.
- In advance of the **Federal election** in early 2022, the Committee released its election considerations. Australia's ongoing security and prosperity will be underpinned by a healthy economy, which requires efficient and productive cities. The Committee welcomes federal government support to improve housing affordability, talent attraction and retention, and the clean energy transition.

Digital Innovation Festival (DIF)

→ The Committee was honoured to have partnered with the Victorian Government on the annual Digital Innovation Futures Festival (DIF), which included a series of live events, complemented by a range of on-demand content.

Having become a highlight of the Melbourne events calendar, the Victorian Government's DIF aimed to engage with the tech sector, promote innovation, and encourage businesses and individuals to make a difference through digital technologies.

In its seventh year, DIF helped reconnect the Victorian innovation and technology ecosystem and reinvigorate the digital economy. Sessions focused on supporting businesses to get online and explore how we can better foster digital inclusion for all Victorians.

Policy Wins

→ The Committee partnered with other organisations to deliver programs such as the **Cremonne Digital Hub** and the *Give Me Shelter* report by **SGS Economics and Planning** and **Housing All Australians**. The report shows there is underinvestment in social and affordable housing, which is a significant cost to Australian taxpayers. This cost will reach \$25 billion annually by 2051 (in 2021 dollars) if nothing is done to address this chronic shortage.

The benefit-cost ratio is 2:1 for investment in social and affordable housing, which is greater than the benefit-cost ratios used to justify many current Australian infrastructure projects. This study comes at a time when the Committee's *Benchmarking Melbourne* report shows that house prices have skyrocketed, and Melbourne is now the 6th most expensive housing market in the world. The Committee's support included communications and

marketing as well as an online forum that attracted hundreds of attendees.

The Committee has also achieved advocacy wins and welcomed the recent plan presented to Parliament by the Hon Catherine King MP, Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, to establish a **High-Speed Rail Authority**. This new Authority would advise on a high-speed rail network that might connect Melbourne to Brisbane.

This follows the Committee's 2020 report - *Reimagining Australia's South-East*. The report, commissioned from SGS Economics and Planning, details the extensive economic and social benefit that could be achieved if an Eastern Seaboard Megaregion were established from Geelong to the Sunshine Coast. Steps in the development of a mega region, including steps such as high-speed rail, are therefore welcome.

Future Focus Group Program



Future Focus Group Alumni networking event - 07/09/2022

→ Melbourne's own emerging civic leaders' program, the **Future Focus Group Program (FFG)** was first offered in 1996. It is a unique offering for selected emerging leaders in Melbourne to better understand, connect within and contribute to Melbourne while building their leadership capabilities.

FFG is an outstanding opportunity to make real and enduring contributions to Melbourne by being part of the delivery of Committee-sponsored group projects. The Melbourne International Student Week FFG Project, undertaken by six members of the FFG 2020-2021 Program, delivered in May this year, is a great example of this.

Open House Melbourne also evolved from a FFG group project some years ago.

FFG runs over 15 months and features an offsite induction, group projects in diverse teams, 15 evening workshops and active one-on-one mentoring. It is open to member organisations of the Committee, to Victorian Government Departments and to organisations that are not currently member organisations of the Committee. We have 16 participants in the FFG 2022-2023 Program that commenced in February, and the FFG 2023-2024 Program will commence in February 2023.

The FFG Alumni Network Steering Group also arranges and promotes a number of evening events each year that are offered to more than 500 people who have completed FFG or are currently undertaking FFG. These events provide another opportunity for Alumni and current participants to build enduring relationships.
