Since its foundations, the Committee has been a driving force behind significant projects such as:



Annual Member & Stakeholder Survey

The Committee's 2022 Annual Member and Stakeholder Survey, powered by Ipsos helps to shape Melbourne's future and our agenda.

Pleasingly, the results have highlighted a greater sense of optimism as we emerge from the impact of COVID-19 on Melbourne's community and economy.

Survey participants generally felt positive about their organisations' prospect of recovery from COVID-19 over the next year. Most respondents also felt optimistic about Melbourne's resilience in the face of potential future pandemics.

Our annual tracking advocacy priorities showed there was a strong support for the Committee's current agenda, especially regarding **sustainability, housing affordability, transport, arts and culture, innovation, and the experience economy**. This is in line with the findings of the Ipsos Issues Monitor, which highlighted healthcare, housing, cost of living and the economy to be the three most important issues Victoria is facing.

As for our Future Melbourne agenda, the Board of the Committee will now consider the renewed call for climate change and sustainability to be a focus of our agenda.


The Melbourne 'brand' reputation continues to be of concern and these priorities are reflected in the findings of our 2022 Benchmarking Melbourne Report.


There is room to improve among the three pillars as respondents are more likely to say there has been little or no progress made in the past 12 months.

Over the past 12 months, to what extent do you believe Greater Melbourne has made progress with regard to:








Benchmarking Melbourne Report

As Greater Melbourne emerges from the COVID-19 pandemic and grapples with geopolitical and environmental challenges, the time is right to start a discussion on helping Melbourne to reach its full potential.

To kickstart this dialogue, the Committee and JLL engaged The Business of Cities to produce the inaugural *Benchmarking Melbourne Report*.

Under the three pillars that define a great city, the report benchmarks Greater Melbourne's performance against a peer group of 19 global cities. The report will be produced annually, to track results over time and identify key changes and trends.

It comes as no surprise that Melbourne stacks up very well in areas like its rich and diverse cultural foundations, highly regarded research and education institutions and diverse skills base. However, Melbourne must be mindful to ensure these areas are continually supported.

The report also identified areas that don't fare well against the other 19 peer cities.

The report highlights that Greater Melbourne is a tale of two cities. Whilst the CBD and inner suburbs provide walkable cultural and dining options, easy access to inner Melbourne sporting events, plenty of public transport and reliable internet, a significant number of people do not enjoy these benefits.

Rising house prices, particularly in inner and middle Melbourne, and increasingly across Greater Melbourne, are also impacting the cost of living.

With significant advantages in research and education institutions and knowledge companies, Melbourne continues to face challenges in commercialisation and scaling up of technology and innovation.

A clear integrated transport, land-use and economic development plan for Greater Melbourne is also essential for easing congestion, improving movement and providing critical logistics.

The Committee looks forward to working with members and stakeholders on opportunities in areas like transport, infrastructure, housing, skills, visitor economy, technology, innovation, climate change and energy - to drive Melbourne forward.

Everyone - business, institutions, government, entrepreneurs and citizens - has a part to play.

Co-operation across the community and learning from the experiences of our peer cities, will help Melbourne to embrace the opportunities highlighted in the report and drive meaningful change.



Our work



Committee for Melbourne works towards shaping a better future for Greater Melbourne. Together with our members, we make a difference by challenging the status quo and encouraging thought leadership to create change through confident and influential advocacy.

We work across three pillars that help make a city great – **Liveability & Urban Optimisation**, **Future Economy and Infrastructure & Sustainability**. We run events, create networks, deliver leading thinking and advocate on a range of issues for members.

The Committee's focus for 2022-23 and beyond will be on the following key areas that are critical to the future of Melbourne and our members:

Transport

Our Infrastructure & Sustainability Standing Committee transport agenda aims to foster a greater understanding of Melbourne's transport challenges, identify key priorities for action and advocate for change.

The Committee continues to call for the design and implementation of a comprehensive, integrated transport plan that incorporates land use and economic development planning. Successful advocacy on projects such as the removal of level crossings and Melbourne Airport Rail Link demonstrate the positive outcomes that members can have towards Melbourne's future.

Housing

The Committee's *Benchmarking Melbourne Report* shows that Melbourne is the 6th most unaffordable English-speaking metropolis for buying a home. This, coupled with the significant under-supply of social and affordable housing is a key issue for Melburnians that requires immediate action.

In its report, *Delivering Affordable Housing*, the Committee has developed recommendations for increasing the supply of a range of housing options. The Liveability & Urban Optimisation Standing Committee continues to advocate for housing targets and policies to address this issue - and looks forward to the release of the Victorian Government's 10-year Social and Affordable Housing Strategy.

Climate change & energy

Our Infrastructure & Sustainability Standing Committee's climate change agenda aims to ensure that Melbourne plays its role in minimising global warming and has the capacity to mitigate the worst impacts of climate change. Recently, we have called for greater emissions reduction ambition to 2030 and the implementation of a national energy plan. We have also advocated for initiatives like zero emissions vehicles, renewables and transition away from gas.



Experience economy

Melbourne is famous for its experience economy with a wide range of events, sports, theatres, restaurants and attractions, which was hit especially hard by the restrictions imposed through the COVID-19 pandemic. As Melbourne continues to recover, support remains imperative for these businesses that contribute significantly to the fabric of Melbourne's brand identity.

The Liveability & Urban Optimisation Standing Committee continues to advocate for a range of issues across the experience economy including the establishment of a Destination Master Plan and an organisation to manage the Greater Melbourne Experience Economy.

Digital and technology capability

A major economic growth driver will be Australia's capacity to develop its digital and technology sector. The scale and scope of rapid technological developments will drive productivity, growth and investment, improve public services and enable scientific breakthroughs. The Committee will continue to advocate for policies that ensure Australians possess basic digital literacy skills, and that businesses and individuals are able to access and take-up transformative technologies.

Innovation

The Committee's innovation agenda is focussed on the need to translate Melbourne's significant research strengths into strong commercial outcomes. The Future Economy Standing Committee will address issues associated with product commercialisation, including skills development and attraction, regulation and compliance, linking venture capital with local start-ups and research institutes with industry.

Skills

An advanced skills base comprising local and foreign talent will help Melbourne recover from the pandemic and realise opportunities in the new economy. We must also look to position ourselves well in the minds of prospective foreign students and workers and develop policies to attract and retain them. The Future Economy Standing Committee will continue to advocate for initiatives such as a skilled migration program that is responsive to the needs of business and the community; attraction and retention of international students; and programs to educate and upskill workers in STEM. An example of a Committee for Melbourne program driving success in this space is the Inaugural International Students Week in Melbourne in May 2022 successfully launched at Fed Square with over three thousand enthusiast students in attendance.

Events

The Committee's events foster dialogue and connections between government, senior business leaders and influential Melburnians, generating ideas that shape strategies for Melbourne's future success.

We collaborate with our media partners to amplify the important work of the Committee and its members.


Presenting Partnerships

Future Focus Group

Melbourne's future depends on informed, connected and civic-minded leadership.

The Future Focus Group Program, run by the Committee for Melbourne, is a unique opportunity for emerging leaders in Melbourne to better understand, connect within and contribute to Melbourne while building their leadership capabilities.

This emerging civic leaders' program was established in 1996, to create the next generation of civic-minded leaders. It attracts participants from every sector of the Committee's membership base and from other Melbourne-based organisations. The program runs for 15 months, with a new group of participants starting each February.

This unique program has, for over 25 years, fostered practical leadership skills by providing project-based, real-life learning experiences and unique access to senior business and community leaders. Around 500 people have completed the program and continue to participate in events organised for the

Future Focus Group Alumni Network by a Steering Group currently led by Kellie Badge (Class of 2017-2018).


Some examples of work initiated by participants in the program include Open House Melbourne, Free Trams in the CBD and Melbourne International Student Week.



Cities and Regions

Committee for Melbourne is a proud member of the Committees for Cities and Regions Network, which also represents Committees for Adelaide, Auckland (NZ), Ballarat, Brisbane, Broome, Canterbury (NZ), Cairns, Echuca Moama, Geelong, Gippsland, Gold Coast, Greater Frankston, Greater Shepparton, The Hunter, Mornington Peninsula, Perth, Portland, Sydney, Wagga and Wyndham.

The Network is not politically motivated or aligned, and works in harmony with many groups, stakeholders and organisations that are also acting in the best interests of their communities. The Network is a unifying voice to share views and advocate collectively for the future.

One example of the collaboration at work was a united call in November 2021 for a more ambitious national roadmap towards Net Zero by 2050, urging the government to seize the momentum by lifting the 2030 carbon emissions reduction target ambition and committing to significant investment in the acceleration of clean technologies.

The Committee acts as the Secretariat for the Network and can enable connections with the various organisations for our members. We also facilitate a series of collaborative forums with Victorian and National agendas that our members can support.


